## Removable Wall Coverings

Here's a job that is best tackled while wearing a pair of TOMS red sparkle shoes. Do you know about TOMS shoes? This is a company that set out to make a difference. While traveling in Argentina in 2006, American Blake Mycoskie realized that some of the children there had no shoes to protect their feet. Wanting to help, he created TOMS Shoes (www.toms.com), a company that would match every pair of shoes purchased with a pair of new shoes given to a child in need. One for One. Blake returned to Argentina with a group of family, friends, and staff later that year with 10,000 pairs of shoes made possible by TOMS customers and their One for One Movement, and by 2010, TOMS had given away one million pairs of shoes!

Once you have your magical red shoes on, the next thing you need is some of your favorite lightweight cotton fabric that has been pre-washed (for shrinkage) and ironed, a measuring tape, sharp scissors and utility knife, level, pencil, push pins, 10"-wide putty/taping knife, heavy spray starch, and a brush or paint roller to spread the love, I mean, starch or wallpaper paste. Simple and super budget-conscious. It can cost a fraction of what expensive wallpaper costs (especially if, like me, you have leftover bolts of fabric in your stash). Removable fabric walls are an affordable and easily reversible way to add texture and color to a wall.

- 1 Clean the wall in preparation or use drywall that has been primed.
- 2 Measure from the top of the wall to the bottom.
- adding an extra 4" to your wall measurement (you'll leave 2" extra on both the top and the bottom of each panel when positioning it on the wall and then trim it off later). If you have to match the pattern in your fabric from panel to panel, figure that out now and be sure to adjust the measurement of the length of your fabric before you cut your second piece.
- Thank the width of the fabric panel on the wall from top to bottom using a level, starting at a corner of the room and measuring out from the corner.
- 5 ROII liquid starch or wallpaper paste (I used Zinsser Sure Grip Allpurpose Adhesive and Wall Size, www.amazon.com) onto the wall with a paint roller or large brush, starting in the upper corner.
- Secure the top of one panel of fabric near the ceiling using push pins, leaving 2" extra at the top to be cut off later.
- Fig. 5 mooth the fabric with the putty/taping knife to remove air bubbles and wrinkles, working top to bottom.
- 8 Repeat the process, aligning a second panel with the first and overlapping about ½". If you have to align the repeat pattern in the fabric horizontally, you can overlap the panels more or carefully cut the fabric.
- 9 Let dry for 24 hours. If you have some air bubbles, try spraying heavy spray starch on the spot and work the bubble out with your fingertips.
- 10 Remove the push pins.
- off the extra fabric at the top and bottom of the wall with a utility knife, using the putty/taping knife as your edge.

When you're in the mood for a different look, simply peel the fabric away. You'll be able to launder the fabric and use it for another project.
