

# 3/16" Baling Twine Crochet Bag: Large

## FINISHED SIZE: 14" tall, 17" diameter

In our area, TWINE IS AVAILABLE in two different sizes (thicknesses).

Baling twine that is used on the the standard rectangular bales of hay or straw is about 3/16" thick.

Baling twine that is used for the great big round bales of hay is about **1/8**" thick. Just for identification purposes, we tested our pattern by buying a box, since we use only the standard bales at our farm. It came in a box with 2 spools of twine, 20,000 feet total. Tensile strength: 110 lbs.

INSTRUCTIONS		

Rnd 1: Ch 3, sl st together.

**Rnd 2:** Ch 1, 8 sc in center hole, sl st to 1<sup>st</sup> sc.

Rnd 3: Ch 3 (counts as 1<sup>st</sup> dc), \*2 dc in top of each sc\* around, sl st to 1<sup>st</sup> dc. (Total of 15 dc.) Sl st in next sp.

From this point forward, all rounds begin with Ch 3 (counts as 1<sup>st</sup> dc), and end with sl st to 1<sup>st</sup> dc. Sl st in next sp.

Rnd 4: \*2 dc in each of next 2 sps, dc in next sp\* around, 2 dc in each of last 2 sps.

Rnd 5: \*2 dc in next sp, dc in next sp\* around.

Rnd 6: \*2 dc in next sp, dc in each of next 2 sps\* around.

Rnd 7: Dc in each sp around.

Rnd 8: Repeat Rnd 7.

Rnd 9: \*2 dc in next sp, dc in each of next 3 sps \* around.

Rnd 10 - 16: Repeat Rnd 7.

**Rnd 17:** Dc in each of next 4 sps, ch 3, skip 3 sps, \* dc in each of next 5 sps, ch 3, skip 3 sps; dc in each of next 4 sps, ch 3, skip 3 sps,\* around, dc in each of next 6 sps, ch 3, skip 3 sps.

**Rnd 18:** Dc in each of next 3 sps, dc in each ch st and in each st before and after the chs (5 total), \* dc in each of next 4 sps, dc in each ch st and in each st before and after the chs; dc in each of next 3 sps, dc in each ch st and in each st before and after the chs \* around, dc in each of next 5 sps, dc in each ch st and in each st before and after the chs. **Rnd 19:** Repeat Rnd 7. End off. Weave loose end to the inside of bag. Tie a knot to secure. Finish weaving in loose end.

### TO MAKE HANDLE:

Ch a strip 55" long (about 77 chs), dc in 3<sup>rd</sup> ch from hook and in each ch to the end. End off, leaving a long tail. Weave end of handle through openings in bag. Using tail, sl st handle ends together. Tie a square knot with ending tail and beginning tail. Weave in loose ends. (Use a square knot for piecing twine together for handle. Stitch loose ends with thread so knots don't interfere with sliding action.)

### FINISHING

If desired, stitch loose twine tail with thread to hold securely.

### **GAUGE**: 5" = 7 dc

### TIPS

Leave a long beginning tail of twine to crochet over as you go, or weave in after finishing your bag. It should increase strength and decrease the likelihood of the bag unraveling.

To knot twine pieces together, just use an overhand knot if you want the little tails to stick out for decorative purposes. Use a square knot to tie twine pieces together if you want to sew the loose ends to the bag.

# 3/16" Baling Twine Crochet Bowl

# FINISHED SIZE: 5" tall, 12" diameter

In our area, TWINE IS AVAILABLE in two different sizes (thicknesses).

Baling twine that is used on the the standard rectangular bales of hay or straw is about 3/16" thick.

Baling twine that is used for the great big round bales of hay is about **1/8**" thick. Just for identification purposes, we tested our pattern by buying a box, since we use only the standard bales at our farm. It came in a box with 2 spools of twine, 20,000 feet total. Tensile strength: 110 lbs.

SUPPLIES Crochet Hook, Size P 3/16" Scrap Baling Twine	ch	chain
	chs	chains
	sl st	slip stitch
	st	stitch
Matching All-Purpose Thread	dc	double crochet

INSTRUCTIONS

Rnd 1: Ch 3, sl st together.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, 8 sc in center hole, sl st to 1<sup>st</sup> sc.

Rnd 3: Ch 3 (counts as 1<sup>st</sup> dc), \*2 dc in top of each sc\* around, sl st to 1<sup>st</sup> dc. (Total of 15 dc.) Sl st in next sp.

From this point forward, all rounds begin with Ch 3 (counts as 1<sup>st</sup> dc), and end with sl st to 1<sup>st</sup> dc. Sl st in next sp.

Rnd 4: \*2 dc in each of next 2 sps, dc in next sp\* around, 2 dc in each of last 2 sps.

Rnd 5: \*2 dc in next sp, dc in next sp\* around.

Rnd 6: \*2 dc in next sp, dc in each of next 2 sps\* around.

Rnd 7: Dc in each sp around.

Rnd 8 - 9: Repeat Rnd 7. End off. Weave loose end to the inside of bowl. Tie a knot to secure.

Finish weaving in loose end.

### FINISHING

If desired, stitch loose twine tails with thread to hold securely.

### GAUGE: 5" = 7 dc

### TIPS

Leave a long beginning tail of twine to crochet over as you go, or weave in after finishing your bowl. It should increase strength and decrease the likelihood of the bowl unraveling.

To knot twine pieces together, just use an overhand knot if you want the little tails to stick out for decorative purposes. Use a square knot to tie twine pieces together if you want to sew the loose ends to the bowl.

# 3/16" Baling Twine Crochet Bag: Medium

### FINISHED SIZE: 14" tall, 14" diameter (same as Large, but 3" smaller diameter)

In our area, TWINE IS AVAILABLE in two different sizes (thicknesses).

Baling twine that is used on the the standard rectangular bales of hay or straw is about 3/16" thick.

Baling twine that is used for the great big round bales of hay is about 1/8" thick. Just for identification purposes, we tested our pattern by buying a box, since we use only the standard bales at our farm. It came in a box with 2 spools of twine, 20,000 feet total. Tensile strength: 110 lbs.

SUPPLIES	ch	chain
Crochet Hook, Size P	chs	chains
3/16" Scrap Baling Twine	sl st	slip stitch
	st	stitch
Matching All-Purpose Thread	dc	double crochet
INSTRUCTIONS	sp	space
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Rnd 1: Ch 3, sl st together.

**Rnd 2:** Ch 1, 8 sc in center hole, sl st to 1<sup>st</sup> sc.

Rnd 3: Ch 3 (counts as 1<sup>st</sup> dc), \*2 dc in top of each sc\* around, sl st to 1<sup>st</sup> dc. (Total of 15 dc.) Sl st in next sp.

From this point forward, all rounds begin with Ch 3 (counts as 1<sup>st</sup> dc), and end with sl st to 1<sup>st</sup> dc. Sl st in next sp.

**Rnd 4:** \*2 dc in each of next 2 sps, dc in next sp\* around, 2 dc in each of last 2 sps.

Rnd 5: \*2 dc in next sp, dc in next sp\* around.

Rnd 6: \*2 dc in next sp, dc in each of next 2 sps\* around.

Rnd 7: Dc in each sp around.

Rnd 8 - 16: Repeat Rnd 7.

**Rnd 17:** \*Dc in each of next 4 sps, ch 2, skip 2 sps, \* around.

Rnd 18: \*Dc in each of next 3 sps, dc in each ch st and in each st before and after the chs (4 total) \* around.

Rnd 19: Repeat Rnd 7. End off. Weave loose end to the inside of bag. Tie a knot to secure. Finish weaving in loose end.

### TO MAKE HANDLE:

Ch a strip 55" long (about 77 chs), dc in 3<sup>nd</sup> ch from hook and in each ch to the end. End off, leaving a long tail. Weave end of handle through openings in bag. Using tail, sl st handle ends together. Tie a square knot with ending tail and beginning tail. Weave in loose ends.

(Use a square knot for piecing twine together for handle. Stitch loose ends with thread so knots don't interfere with sliding action.)

#### FINISHING

If desired, stitch loose twine tails with thread to hold securely.

### **GAUGE**: 5" = 7 dc

# 1/8" Baling Twine Crochet Bag: Medium

Crochet Hook, Size L	chs	chains
	sl st	slip stitch
1/8" Scrap Baling Twine Matching All-Purpose Thread	st	stitch
	dc	double crochet
INSTRUCTIONS Rnd 1: Ch 3, sl st together.	sp	space
	sps	spaces
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Rnd 1: Ch 3, sl st together.

**Rnd 2:** Ch 1, 8 sc in center hole, sl st to 1<sup>st</sup> sc.

Rnd 3: Ch 3 (counts as 1<sup>st</sup> dc), \*2 dc in top of each sc\* around, sl st to 1<sup>st</sup> dc. (Total of 15 dc.) Sl st in next sp.

From this point forward, all rounds begin with Ch 3 (counts as 1<sup>st</sup> dc), and end with sl st to 1<sup>st</sup> dc. Sl st in next sp.

Rnd 4: \*2 dc in each of next 2 sps, dc in next sp\* around, 2 dc in each of last 2 sps.

Rnd 5: \*2 dc in next sp, dc in next sp\* around.

Rnd 6: \*2 dc in next sp, dc in each of next 2 sps\* around.

Rnd 7: Dc in each sp around.

Rnd 8: Repeat Rnd 7.

Rnd 9: \*2 dc in next sp, dc in each of next 3 sps \* around.

Rnd 10 - 11: Repeat Rnd 7.

Rnd 12: Repeat Rnd 9.

Rnd 13 - 17: Repeat Rnd 7.

Rnd 18: \*2 dc in next sp, dc in each of next 10 sps \* around, 2 dc in next sp, dc in each of next 8 sps.

Rnd 19 - 26: Repeat Rnd 7.

Rnd 27: \*Dc in each of next 7 sps, ch 3, skip 3 sps\* around, dc in each of last 2 sps.

Rnd 28: \*Dc in each of next 6 sps, dc in each ch st and in each st before and after the chs (5 total) \* around, dc in each of last 2 sps.

Rnd 29 & 30: Repeat Rnd 7. End off. Weave loose end to the inside of bag. Tie a knot to secure. Finish weaving in loose end.

### **TO MAKE HANDLE:**

Ch a strip 55" long (about 99 chs), dc in 3rd ch from hook and in each ch to the end. End off, leaving a long tail. Weave end of handle through openings in bag. Using tail, sl st handle ends together. Tie a square knot with ending tail and beginning tail. Weave in loose ends.

(Use a square knot for piecing twine together for handle. Stitch loose ends with thread so knots don't interfere with sliding action.)

### FINISHING

If desired, stitch loose twine tails with thread to hold securely.

**GAUGE**: 5" = 9 dc
