


Be a Bombshell

Later, she maintained the most remote wilderness ranger station in the Lower 48. Today, Butters and her family live eight miles outside Moscow, Idaho, on their farm, headquarters of her mail-order dry-foods business. But even e-commerce hasn't tempered Butters' enthusiasm for simplicity.

Plant a Pink Flamingo



Stake your claim with classic kitsch: a pink flamingo yard ornament! I found my garden-tool flamingo (left) at a craft sale, but BellaSoleil.com also has a glamorous gal that's guaranteed to gussy up your glampsite and kindle conversation ... heck, you might be

kindling when you're lighting a campfire? Ignite a glampfire using fragrant herbs and spices. Dried sage, lavender, rosemary, cinnamon sticks, whole nutmeg, and even pinecones will spark and scent the flaming centerpiece of your glampsite. Here's how: Arrange a handful of dried goodies in the center of a folded sheet of newspaper. Roll it up, twist each end, and secure with raffia or cotton twine. Nestle four or five bundles under your logs, leaving a few ends sticking out for easy lighting.

Flaunt Your Flowers

Few decorations doll up a glampsite as nicely as nature's own beautiful bouquets, and one of the finest ways I've found to flaunt freshly picked flowers is in garden stake vases. Ring your site in summer splendor by tethering upcycled glass bottles to rustic tree branch stakes, then fill with water and flowers.
