
Share Energy

rganic farmer MaryJane Butters long ago embraced Thoreau's dictum to "simplify, simplify." As a Forest Service ranger in the 1970s, she spent two summers roaming Utah's Uinta Mountains with her home on her back. Later, she maintained the most remote wilderness ranger station in the Lower 48. Today, Butters and her family live eight miles outside Moscow, Idaho, on their farm, headquarters of her mail-order dry-foods business. But even e-commerce hasn't tempered Butters' enthusiasm for simplicity.

Share a Ride

In several U.S. cities, car owners provide transportation to neighbors, co-workers, friends, and even strangers through Zimride, a "peer-to-peer" ride-sharing service. Passengers use smartphones to locate and request drivers, who are guaranteed to have a reliable car, a clean driving record, and a clean background check. Find out more at Zimride.com.

Seven del Share Clothing A community clothing quan is

a great way to exchange clothes without any money changing hands. Participants wash items before bringing them to the swap, which can be held at someone's house or a community center. Everyone wears a swimsuit or spandex under their street clothes so they can try stuff on before taking it home; if something doesn't fit, toss it back into the pile so someone else can try. Share Workspace

Coworking space is occupied by work-at-home professionals, independent contractors, and freelancers who seek a community environment.
